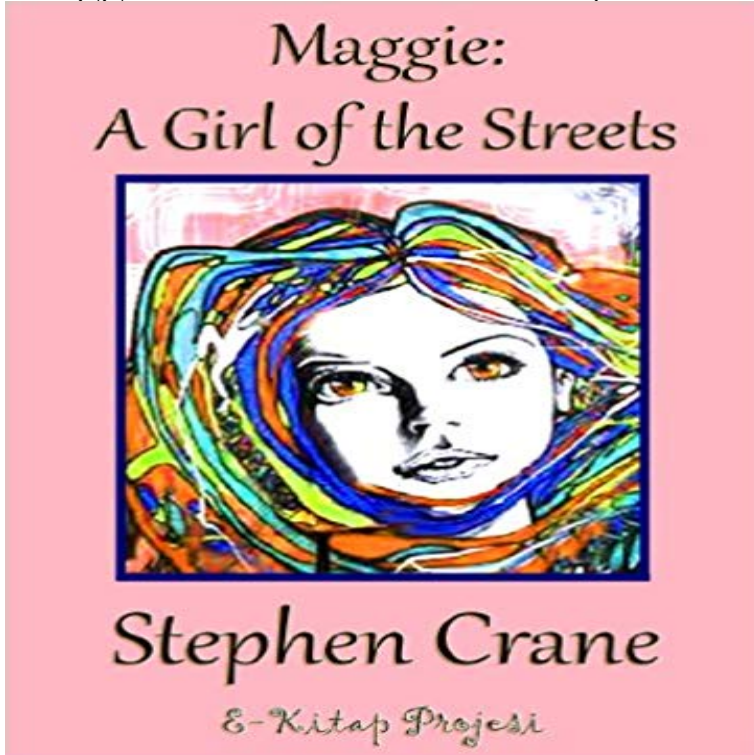


Maggie: A Girl of the Streets (Illustrated)
